### LNFI CAMP 2016

What opportunities are provided to at-risk children with envisioning futures? The LNFI camp set out to provide 40 at-risk children the opportunity of a lifetime: to 'rise up' from their seemingly impossible situations into a brighter future.

Experiences such as nature hiking and geocaching promoted increased competence and confidence as they recovered from challenges. Daily small group time allowed them to build stronger connections with one another and their mentors so that they felt a sense of belonging, security and learned to develop creative solutions to their problems. Late night kickball helped each child contribute to the wellbeing of others. During the water games and lake exploration, teams understood privileges and respect that is earned through demonstrated responsibility. Camp fire night and whole group sessions gave way for our children to acquire a clear sense of right and wrong and a

### S.T.E.M. CLUB **Cardboard Boat Regatta**

On April 26<sup>th</sup>, over 20 students involved in STEM Club in 3 of Love Never Fails' after-school programs participated in the 27<sup>th</sup> Annual River Legacy Cardboard Boat Regatta as part of their STEM project for the spring semester. The



Cardboard Boat Regatta is an event hosted by Six Flags Hurricane Harbor where "amateur boat builders are challenged to design, build and navigate boats made entirely of corrugated cardboard." This project truly enveloped LNFI's objective to engage students in STEM disciplines so that they may be inspired to pursue subject areas in school that will equip them with the skills necessary to thrive in a 21st century workforce. Without any prior training or experience in making a cardboard boat, these students skeptically accepted the challenge.

The STEM Club students were given two months to complete three different phases of the project which consisted of Budgeting & Designing, Constructing and Launching. Each phase required the students to take on different roles within the team and to carry out specific tasks. Each team worked together to create an official team name and a team chant that they shouted as they practiced their rowing skills. All of these efforts nourished skills students need to be successful in a STEM focused culture.



On the day of the Boat Regatta, all skepticism turned to pure excitement as the LNFI students launched their boats and participated in this big event along with hundreds of other students from

In May, The Team visited Casa Hogar de Niños Camargo and brought with them vibrant colored bed covers, bed sheets and pillows for the 25 orphaned children living there. These children come from broken homes and traumatic experiences of abuse and neglect. They have very little material possessions of their own.

All 25 of the children also received a brand new pair of tennis shoes and socks. They had been wearing very worn or mixed matched shoes and were so excited to receive a new pair of shoes just in time for the summer. The director of the orphanage, Pastor Osdy Luna, expressed that LNFI had come to offer support at a time when he felt they were "sinking and drowning."

This July, the Team plans to visit Nopalera Colonia and continue investing in the lives of the people in that area by building another fully furnished home for a family in need. For only \$4,500, one house can be built and furnished; A house that becomes a home to a family in Mexico and a home that changes their lives forever!
